



The Preschool Development Grants fund two types of grants:

DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

- Development Grants are for states that currently serve less than 10 percent of four-year-olds and have not received a Race to the Top – Early Learning Challenge grant.
- States with Development Grants are required to implement and sustain high-quality preschool programs in high-need communities.
- A minimum of 65 percent of the award must be used to implement high-quality preschool programs.

EXPANSION GRANTS

- Expansion Grants are for states that currently serve 10 percent or more of four-year-olds or have received a Race to the Top – Early Learning Challenge grant.
- States with Expansion Grants are required to implement and sustain high-quality preschool programs in high-need communities.
- A minimum of 95 percent of the award must be used to implement high-quality preschool programs.

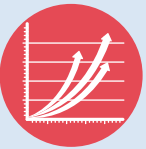


WHAT IS THE PRESCHOOL
DEVELOPMENT GRANTS PROGRAM?

The Preschool Development Grants program supports state efforts to build or enhance their infrastructure to provide high-quality preschool programs and expand high-quality preschool programs in high-need communities. Grantees will:



Create or expand high-quality, inclusive preschool programs in high-need communities;



Build infrastructure and fund quality improvements to support high-quality preschool programs;



Ensure strong partnerships between school and early learning community providers;



Align curricula and instruction within a birth through third grade continuum;



Create sustainable programs by coordinating existing early learning funds; and



Use federal grant dollars and other matching funds to support their efforts.

YEARS ONE & TWO

In December 2014, the U.S. Departments of Education and Health and Human Services awarded grants totaling \$226M to 18 states and in October 2015, the year two awards were announced, totalling \$237M.



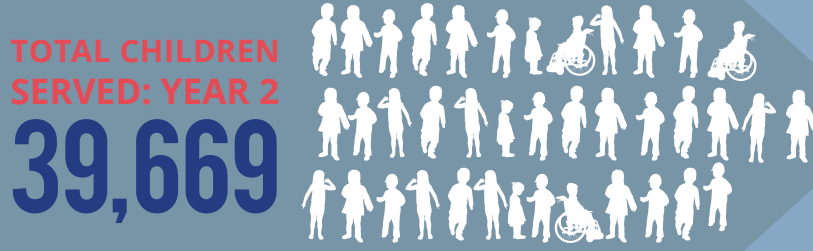
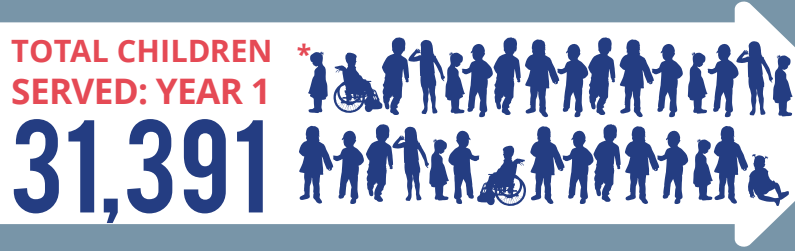
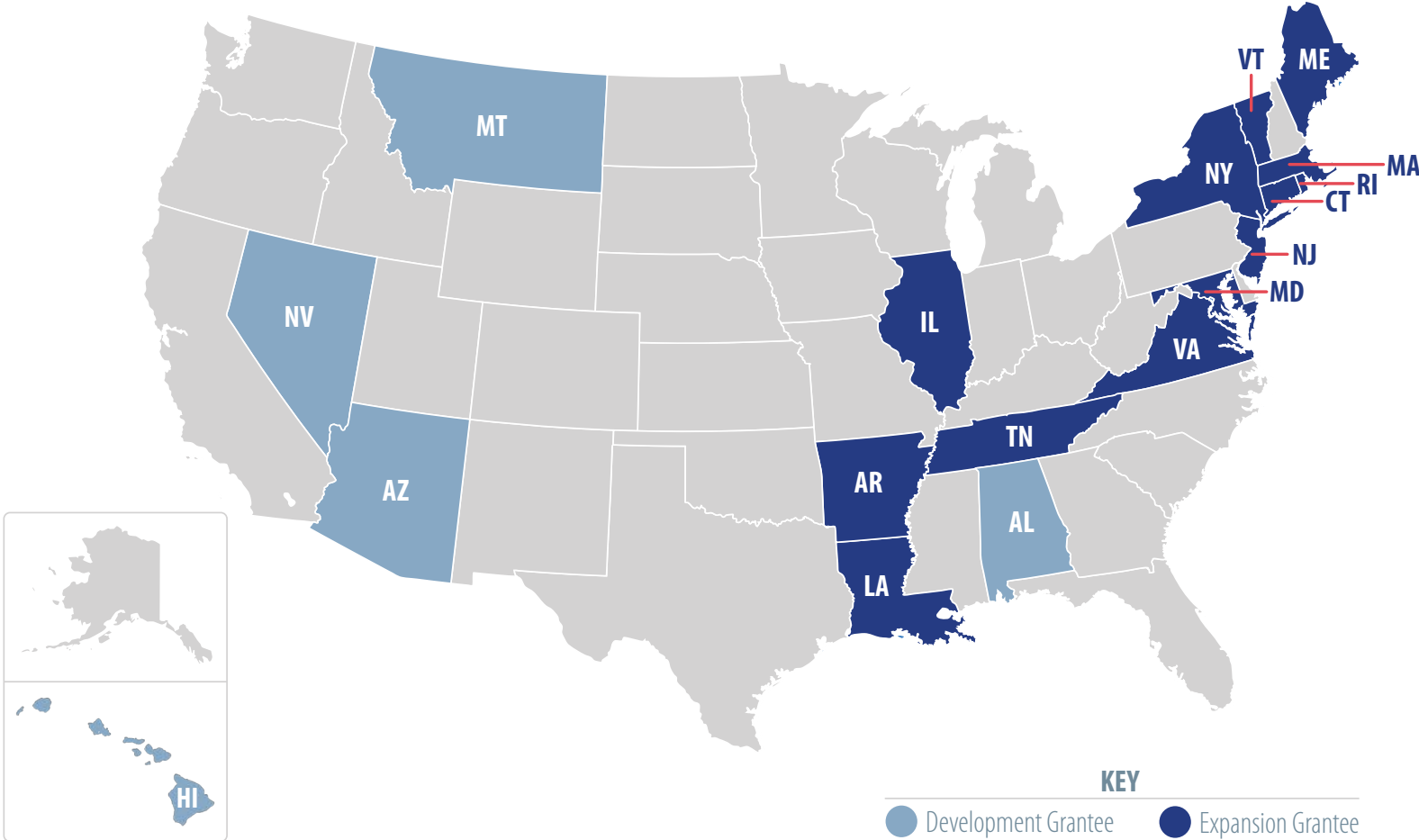
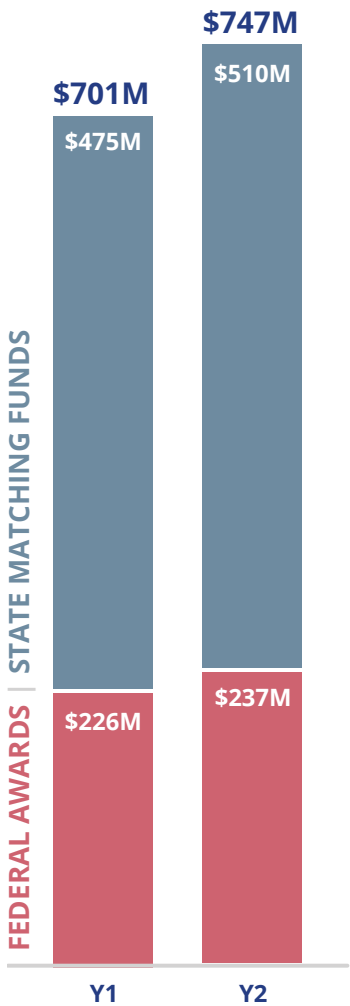
