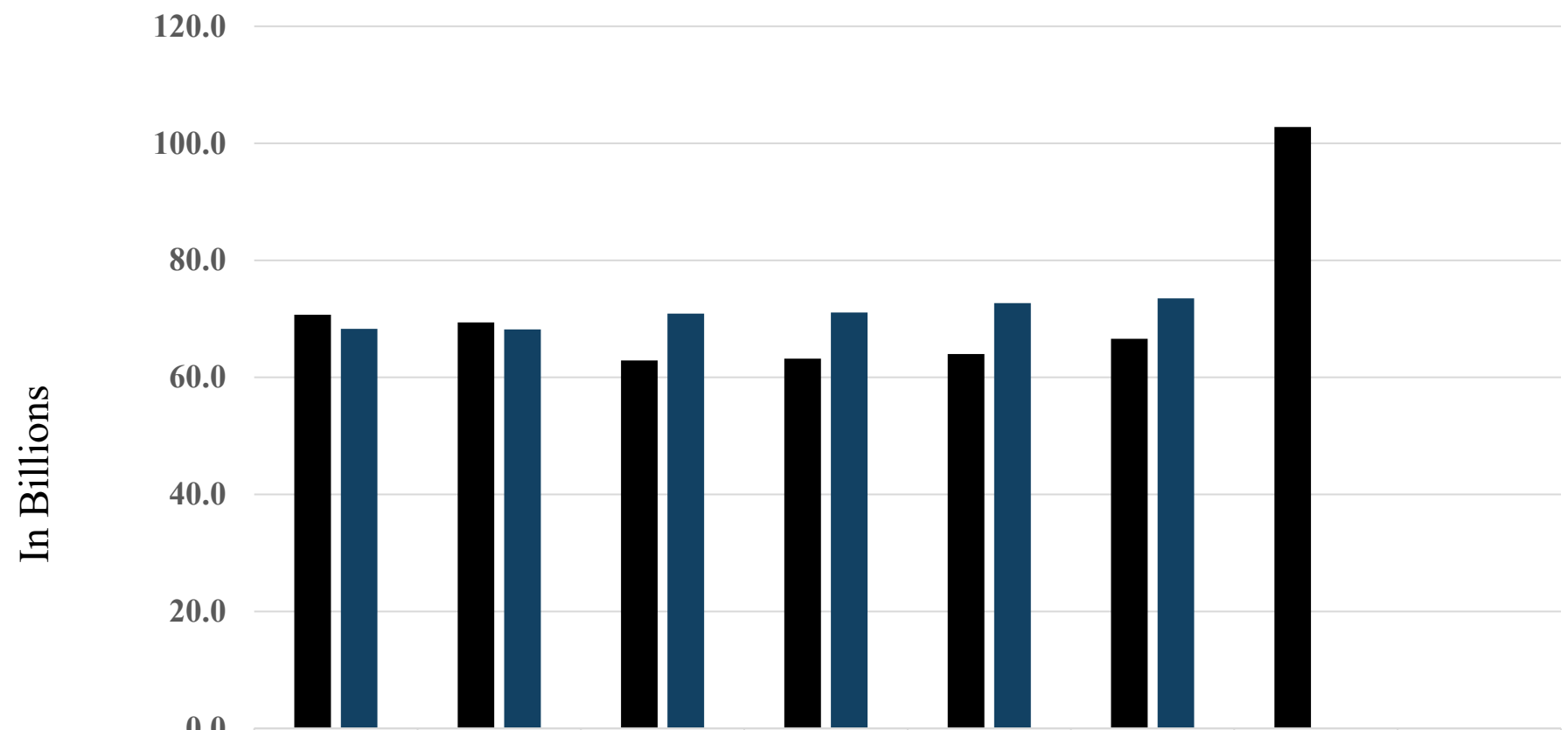


President Biden's Budget Request for FY2022:

- President Biden's FY2022 budget request includes **student-centered and education-centered provisions**. No programs were eliminated or consolidated.
- Includes **\$102.8 billion in new discretionary Budget Authority**, a \$29.8 billion or 41 percent increase above the fiscal year 2021 appropriation.
- Additionally, includes close to **\$50 billion in new mandatory budget authority** in fiscal year 2022 tied to proposals included in the President's American Jobs Plan and American Families Plan.
- **Reverses years of underinvestment in Federal education programs** and begins to address the significant inequities that millions of students—primarily students of color—and teachers confront every day in underserved schools across America.
- **Provides the resources to build our schools back better**, to ensure that the education our students receive in a post-COVID environment is safer, more productive, and more equitable.

Recovery & Rebuilding: Education Provisions in *The American Families Plan*

- **Adds at Least Four Years of Free Education**
 - **2 Years of Free Early Education** – \$200 billion over 10 years for universal, high-quality pre-k for all 3- and 4-year-olds
 - **2 Years of Free Community College** – \$123 billion over 10 years so every student can obtain a degree or certificate, plus another \$62 billion to close college completion gaps
- **Expanding Access to High-Quality Childcare**
 - **\$225 billion** over 10 years to invest in the childcare workforce, early learning curriculum, and so that families can afford high-quality childcare options

Recovery & Rebuilding: Education Provisions in *The American Jobs Plan*

- **Strengthening School Infrastructure**
 - **\$50 billion over 5 years to rebuild and modernize public K-12 schools** to help close the opportunity gap created by unsafe and ill-equipped school facilities in high-poverty school districts
 - **\$12 billion over 5 years to improve community college facilities** and build new facilities in education deserts
- **Expanding Access to Broadband**
 - **\$100 billion over 10 years to bring high-quality, reliable broadband to all American families** which will close the homework gap

Historic Increases for Key Federal Programs that Serve Students Furthest from Opportunity

- **Title I**

- A **\$20 billion increase to Title I**, bringing total investment to \$36 billion for public elementary and secondary schools in the most underserved communities.
- The increase is **part of President Biden's commitment to dramatically increase funding for Title I schools**—that would help address long-standing funding disparities between under-resourced school districts and their wealthier counterparts.

- **Pell Grants**

- **An \$85 billion 10-year investment in Pell as part of the American Families Plan— for a total increase of \$1,875 in the maximum award to \$8,370 - for award year 2022-2023**, to provide additional federal grant assistance for low-income college students, including DREAMers, to access higher education.

Additional Investments to Support Students

- **Boost in support for Children with Disabilities**
 - **\$17.5 billion** for special education programs, with \$15.5 billion for IDEA, a \$2.6 billion increase over FY 21 and **the largest increase to the program in two decades**
- **Support for Physical and Mental Well-Being of Students**
 - **\$1 billion** to double the number of school counselors, nurses, and mental health professionals in k-12 schools, especially in the most underserved schools

Support for Educators

- **Building a Diverse Teacher Pipeline**
 - **Over \$400 million** (including \$280 million in mandatory AFP funding) for Teacher Quality Partnership grants to effectively prepare aspiring teachers
 - **\$60 million** (including \$40 million in mandatory AFP funding) for Augustus Hawkins Centers of Excellence to help diversify the teacher pipeline
- **Educator Training and Support**
 - **\$1.6 billion** to support additional certifications for more than 100,000 educators in high-demand areas like special education, bilingual education, career and technical education, and science, technology, engineering, and mathematics
 - **\$30 million** to recruit and train school leaders
